OFFICER REPORTS

Treasurer Lauther reported a balance of 1,243.05 as of 30 November, 2016. Minutes of the 7 December meeting were approved as read. Vice President Jones and Past President Larson had nothing to report. President Conklin deferred to Business.

Councilman De Marco spoke about his goals for the City, recognizing its diverse population and supporting diversity while encouraging commercial development and economic growth. Encouraging diverse housing, including that for seniors and low income residents, is another priority.

President Conklin asked everyone to review the signup sheets for subcommittees filled out at the December meeting and select committee chairs.

NEW BUSINESS

Volunteer of the Year event will be the first Wednesday in August at the Sherwood Center. Larry Larson will again chair the event.

President Conklin passed a contact list for the Club visitation schedule for update.

They are currently renovating their meeting space, so March would be the earliest availability.

Vision screening: Jan 17-19. at the Lamb Center. Screened 24 persons, eight persons (33%) were referred for specialized vision care (several severe cases for urgent referrals). Many needed readers (available in the Lamb Center, donated by the Lions eyeglass recycling center).

Vision screening: Jan 20 at Green Acres Senior Center. Screened eight seniors, one referred to an optometrist. Center's Director asked Lions to hold another screening on May 4.

New Eyeglasses provided in the community: Purchased 5 in January 2017, purchased 34 so far this Lions Year (July - July), for \$1800. Have 10 requests for eyeglasses pending, from Fairfax County referrals.

Eyeglass Donation and Recycling: Since July 1, 2017, collected 4,385 pair of donated eyeglasses, and 9 hearing aids; delivered to the LIONS EYEGLOSS RECYCLING CENTER OF NORTHERN VIRGINIA. (Since that center opened in 1998, more than 1,800,000 pair of eyeglasses have been sent to persons in need around the world.)

The Central Fairfax Optimist Club dinner meeting held on January 3rd at the Elks Lodge 2188 featured our own Claudia Morcelo. Members had donated backpacks for kids in Peru. Claudia Morcelo and her daughter Amanda distributed fifty backpacks to kids in Los Cedros de Ventanilla (a mountain populated mainly by single mothers and dysfunctional families living in extreme poverty). The majority of these kids walk approximately 30 minutes to an hour to attend the closet school carrying their school supplies in plastic bags, or using old sweaters wrapped around their backs to hold their books. Ninety backpacks were provided to kids in Carabayllo. Nuns that live in that area selected kids in need for these supplies, the kids were extremely grateful. They danced and sang Christmas Carols to the volunteers and parents present. The remaining backpacks were distributed to young girls from "Las Casa Hogar" —victims of domestic violence along with cupcakes.

We have several scholarship contests in process. The Essay Contest and the Communication Contest for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing (CCDHH) can lead to a \$2,500 scholarship. We also sponsor a \$1,000 scholarship competition for seniors in the five area high schools. Finally, our Cub Scout pack at Daniels Run Elementary had a Pinewood Derby on January 28th.
