### **ISCC Minutes 1 February 2017**

President Conklin called the meeting to order at 12:02 PM. Eighteen individuals representing sixteen organizations were present. Councilwoman Ellie Schmidt was a guest. President Conklin gave the invocation and all recited the Pledge of Allegiance.

#### OFFICER REPORTS

Treasurer Lauther reported a balance of \$1,243.05 as of 31 December 2016.

Minutes of the January meeting were approved as read.

Vice President Jones had nothing to report. The Immediate past president was not present.

President Conklin reported on his visit to the Manassas ISCC. He also suggested rotating doing the invocation and leading the Pledge of Allegiance. He asked members to volunteer for those duties. President Conklin also provided information on Youth for Tomorrow.

The Sherwood Center has been reserved for August 2 for the Volunteer of the Year event. It was suggested that nominee be required in May, to ease Program production. No decision was made.

Councilwoman Schmidt spoke about her goals for the city, including easing traffic congestion and encouraging commercial

development. She feels that the City needs to promote transparency and inclusiveness.

#### OLD BUSINESS

Gordon Tillery, chair of the Committee looking at the web site, asked club representatives to look at the current club information on the web site and provide updates to Katie MacCammon. The question of whether creating a common calendar for all of the ISCC organizations was feasible. The Committee will look into the matter.
