ISCC Minutes 7 October 2015

ISCC Minutes – October 7, 2015

President Larson called the meeting to order at 1202 PM. Nineteen individuals representing 20 organizations were present. Chester Smith, of the Manassas InterService Club Council, and Kate MacCammon, a new employee of the City of Fairfax Parks and Recreation were guests.

President Larson gave the invocation and all recited the Pledge of Allegiance.

OFFICER REPORTS

The minutes of the September meeting were approved as read.

Vice President Hoffman provided the roster and asked for further updates as needed.

Treasurer Lauther reported a balance as of 1 August of \$601.14, and a balance as of 31 August of \$901.05, after paying VOY expenses. Income included VOY assessments, web site assessments and a donation. Eleven clubs had paid dues as of 7 October.

President Larson deferred to Business.

OLD BUSINESS

Web Site Update: Vice President Hoffman reported that the web site is now live at iscc_fairfaxva.org. We have the bill for the last part of the development. Future updates will cost \$60.00 per hour, with no charge for work of less than an hour.

Pete Conklin reported that seven Member Organization Visits have been scheduled. ISCC Officers for 2015-2016: The Executive Committee presented two options for dealing with the withdrawal of the individual nominated for President. Option One was to designate outgoing President Larson as Acting President for the coming year. Option Two was to amend the Bylaws to allow a President to serve more than two one year terms in the event a willing candidate cannot be found. Amending the bylaws requires the proposed amendment to be discussed at one meeting and voted on at the following meeting. It was moved, seconded and approved unanimously that both options be accepted, designating outgoing President Larson as Acting President immediately, but voting to change the Bylaws at the next meeting.

NEW BUSINESS

Plans for 2015-16: Acting President Larson discussed plans for the upcoming year, emphasizing succession planning, and discussing possible speakers.

ServiceSource, an organization providing resources for those with disabilities to organizations and individuals in the community, applied for membership in the ISCC. They offer rehabilitation services, job placement, day habilitation and housing opportunities. The organization serves nearly 16,000 individuals annually through a range of customized services. After discussion of their mission, the group admitted them to membership.

The meeting was adjourned at 1:12 PM

- Oct 24: Participation in a 3-mile "Walk Our Way" family fun day at Westfield HS in Chantilly. This event was sponsored by the Virginia Department for the Blind and Vision Impaired. Fairfax Lions assisted with vision screening in conjunction with the Lions Sight & Hearing van.
- Continued collection, delivery, and processing of donated glasses and hearing aids. Fairfax Lions participate in this effort twice a month at the Northern Virginia Lions Eyeglass Recycling Center in Arlington. The glasses and hearing aids are donated to the poor around the world, and are frequently part of Medical Mission trips.
- Continued "Bingo Night" at Fairfax Nursing Center, a nursing & rehabilitation center. Fairfax Lions lead the twice monthly event and provide friendly and caring assistance to those who have difficulty playing.
