### Planters on Main St. Downtown

On Friday the informal downtown appearance group installed some sample planter containers and plant materials along a portion of Main Street in front of Paint Your Own Pottery. These are "test" samples and we are seeking your opinion this week. The group worked with the garden club Fairfax Ferns to identify some containers and materials that would be attractive, appropriate and relatively easy to maintain. Some of the plant materials recommended by Ferns are not available yet this spring so we substituted to approximate color or size and scale. Our intention is to install planters and plants for both sides of the entire block on Main Street between University and Chain Bridge this year. This is part of a larger downtown streetscape planning project currently in early design.

The container design is styled after similar 1900's British urban planters. (The originals are made out of lead). The intended plants would include tree roses, evergreens, a perimeter ring of annuals for color and some trailing ivy. Please take a look this week and let me know what you think.
