Another Month—another project: Fairfax Civitan Club Has Coat Drive

In January, the Fairfax Civitan Club began collecting new or gently used coats and winter wraps. The original intent was to distribute them to folks in our area who needed them. The weather did not cooperate with the timing of the coat drive, often turning out to be more springlike than cold. When Fairfax Civitan heard of the needs created by the terrible Earthquake in Turkey and Syria, we decided to redirect most of the items collected to Turkey. That country is in the middle of its cold season, and a huge number of people have lost everything. The Turkish Embassy was collecting donations, and the Turkish Airlines flew the contributions to Turkey for distribution. Contributors were asked to sort winter wraps, pack them in clear bags, mark the contents on the bag, and bring them to the Embassy. We delivered a large van load of warm wraps to the Embassy. The folks working

at the Embassy collection point helped unload and were extremely grateful for the donations. Most of the items Fairfax Civitan collected went to Turkey. Items received after the delivery to the Embassy will be given to local agencies for distribution to the needy.

Women's Auxiliary

The Salvation Army Women's Auxiliary meets on the third Wednesday of each month (September through May, excluding December) at 10:30 a.m. at the Fairfax Salvation Army Corps headquarters located at 4915 Ox Road in Fairfax, VA.

The Women's Auxiliary met on February 15, which was the first meeting since Novembers 2022. Members discussed the low attendance for in-person meetings and are re-considering virtual options, which must be approved by the Captains. Members also discussed the dire need to recruit new members and are considering some of the public events sponsored by Parks and Recreation, along with advertising in some of the local newsletters. Captain Kadian reported that the Red Kettle Campaign raised a TOTAL of \$89,000, of which \$18,000 was raised specifically by volunteers. This is a clarification of the amount previously reported to ISCC last month. Participants in the Red Kettle Campaign include the Captains, paid bell-ringers, and volunteers (such as individuals and organizations).

She also reported that they have received approval to expand the Afterschool Program by converting it to a Boys and Girls Club of America. They are working on completing required paperwork and preparing a budget. Their goal is to register at least 50 children. The new program will require more staff, and they are seeking approval to hire a program ministries assistant. In addition, two part-time positions have already been approved and they are seeking applicants.

Our speaker, Toni Zollicoffer, Director of Fairfax County's Domestic and Sexual Violence Service (DSVS) gave an excellent presentation, including the new strategic plan and the process used to develop it. As the program's revised Mission and Vision are only 2 years old, these remain consistent as they are excellent and now include transformation as a key component. The Strategic Plan has six priorities. The strategic plan puts a more targeted focus on sexual assault as domestic violence has taken center stage while the program focused on building and educating community. DSVS has many services involving counseling, safe shelter, supportive service, working on a protocol on gun access, community training, educating middle and high school students, services for those who harm others, staffing a 24-hour hotline, and counseling for young children where domestic violence and abuse occur. I would recommend

Toni as a speaker for any ISCC club. She also has an excellent power point.
