Historic Fairfax City Incorporated

The HFCI Annual meeting was held at the Blenheim Interpretative Center on May 10, 2023.

Before our speaker was introduced, Susan Gray went over the calendar of events that are coming up. On Saturday June 17, there will be a free inaugural event to celebrate Juneteenth National Independence Day (when enslaved people near Galveston Texas were freed in 1865). There will be an opening ceremony at Veterans Amphitheater followed by a parade to Mount Calvary Baptist Church where there will be other events. On July 4 there will be a celebration of the birthday of the Fairfax Museum and Visitor Center – 31st Birthday. The Museum Building was built as a

school in 1873 and is the oldest two story brick public schoolhouse in Fairfax County. The bricks were made of clay from a clay pit on the Farr property across the street.

The speaker at the annual meeting was Dr. Lynn Rainville who is the Director of Institutional History at Washington and Lee University. She was also the founding director of the Tusculum Institute for public history and historic preservation at Sweet Briar College. Her talk was entitled "Doing their bit – the Role of Virginia and Virginians in the Great War."
