

The Salvation Army Women's Auxiliary meets on the third Wednesday of each month (September through May, excluding December) at 10:30 AM at the Fairfax Salvation Army Corps headquarters located at 4915 Ox Road in Fairfax. VA.

The Auxiliary met on May 8, 2024. Captain Kadian was in attendance in addition to several of the Auxiliary members and a quest. The Auxiliary members completed the assembly of 50 bags for the summer campers. In addition to the supplies, the Auxiliary members wrote individual notes to each of the 50 campers to provide encouragement and let them know what they can expect

A fundraising effort that has been discussed for several months within the Auxiliary is finally coming to fruition. The CEO of the Capital Restaurant Group (including Paisano's) has agreed to donate 20% of his Paisano's sales for one day to the Salvation Army. Two points of contact with the Salvation Army will coordinate with him for this donation.

A member of the Auxiliary has been selected as our ISCC Volunteer of the Year. The necessary documentation, including a biography of the nominee, will be submitted to Larry Larson no later than the deadline of June 7.

Captain Kadian has provided the dates for the backpack assembly and the Angel Tree Program as follows:

Registration for backpacks will take place on July 15 through 18. Assembly will take place on July 29 through 31. Distribution will take place on August 5 and 6.

For the Angel Tree program, registration will take place on September 9 through September 12 in person at the Corps. Distribution will take place on December 16 and December 17. Times will be provided in the near future. Goals for this year are 450 families and 900 children.

Captain Jowens is still seeking sponsorships of children attending the Summer Day Camp to take place at the Corps between June 24 and July 26. Sponsors can choose to pay \$50 for 1 child for 1 week or \$200 for 1 child for the entire camp. Checks for sponsorship should be made payable to Salvation Army Fairfax with Summer Day Camp noted on the Memo Line.

The Salvation Army is planning a 5K walk/run on Saturday, September 28. The walk/run begins and ends at the Corps at 4915 Ox Rd, Fairfax, VA 22030. All proceeds raised will benefit the Corp's After School Program



ADVOCACY

Elimination of Child Marriage in Virgina — HB994. The bill passed the Virgina House of Delegates and the Virgnia Senate. The bill was signed by the Governor on the last day for his signing or vetoing of bills. Our coalition of Zonta Club of Fairfax, VANOW, Unchained at Last, and Tahirih Justice Center worked together on this bill.

Our current major advocacy project is Sign for ERA. This is a national petition to the Congress asking it to pass a resolution to make the ERA an amendment to the Constitution. The ERA has received the needed number of state legislative bodies to pass it. Virginia was the last to approve to bring the number needed.

BUSINESS

As part of our learning more about women's suffrage and the 19th Amendment and the ERA, the club met on Saturday, June 1 at the Turning Point Suffragist Memorial in Occoquan Regional Park. The nineteen panels tell a truly courageous story of women fighting for the right to vote. They tell the story of the role of the Lorton Work House and its brutality that was the "turning point" in the struggle. The 20th panel awaits the passage of the ERA. I highly recommend visiting this memorial. The whole memorial is a beautiful and striking one. The club inducted new officers at the May 4th and June 1st meetings.
