With September, the Lodge renews its focus on children's charities by reestablishing its contacts

with local schools. We contact schools in the area to plan for the execution of our six most significant charitable programs serving school children: 1) backpack lunches, 2) dictionaries for third graders. 3) scholarships for high school seniors, 4) safety glasses for high school shop programs, 5) Americanism Essay awards for fifth through eighth graders, and 6) continued sponsoring of our local Boy Scout troop. Of course, our commitment to support the military and Veterans continues, with two trips conducted in September to restock the snack freezers at the USO lounges at Reagan airport and Fort Myers in Arlington. In addition, we provide meeting space for selected community groups at nominal charges: Fairfax retired educators. VA alumni, the Embroider Guild of America, Ducks Unlimited, several dancing clubs, and others.

Although we are fortunate to receive Elk's grant funds for some of these activities, we also conduct fund raisers for the bulk of our charitable activities. On Saturday, September 21st, for example, we held a very successful and fun fashion show for our members, which allowed us to raise over \$2,000 in one day to support our charities for children. Our primary source of funding is from large private entities requiring significant space for major events. Our social activities for September included four Friday night dances, bingo and trivia on Thursday half-priced burger nights, a couple Wednesday dinner nights, and sandwiches and drinks after our Tuesday night meetings. With the advent of the football season, we will expand our services on both Fridays and Saturdays.
